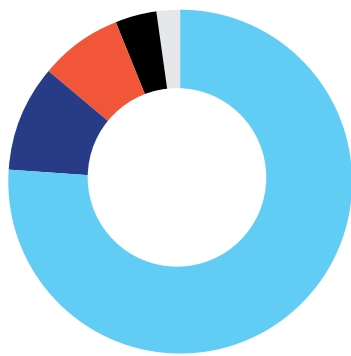

Who we heard from...



More than 3000 people

- 77% from Christchurch
- 10% from Selwyn
- 8% from Waimakariri district
- 4% from Banks Peninsula District
- 2% outside Greater Christchurch



- 42% between the ages of 25 and 50
- 37% over the age of 50
- 12% under the age of 25

- 80% identified as being New Zealand European

What people want Greater Christchurch to be like in 2050

- 43% Waste is minimised, with good options to reuse and recycle
- 46% There is a lot of green space and trees
- 45% People feel safe
- 53% Public transport, walking and cycling are easy and affordable
- 48% Nature, including waterbodies are protected and respected

How people ranked each priority

- 1 Public transport, walking and cycling are easy and affordable
- 2 People feel safe
- 3 Lots of green spaces and trees
- 4 Nature, including waterbodies are protect and respected
- 5 Waste is minimised with good options to reuse and recycle

- I can access my every day needs close to my home
- Christchurch central city is thriving

“ Thinking ahead in terms of public transport. Don't let Christchurch be another Auckland, whereby it is too late to build appropriate infrastructure to accommodate growth

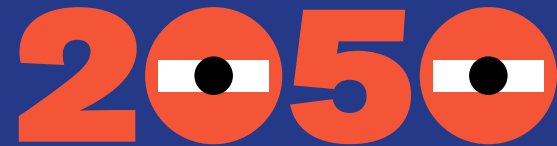
“ I would love to see the green spaces kept, and remain accessible - it is what makes Christchurch unique

“ It needs to be a vibrant place, lots of green spaces and native ecosystems, world class

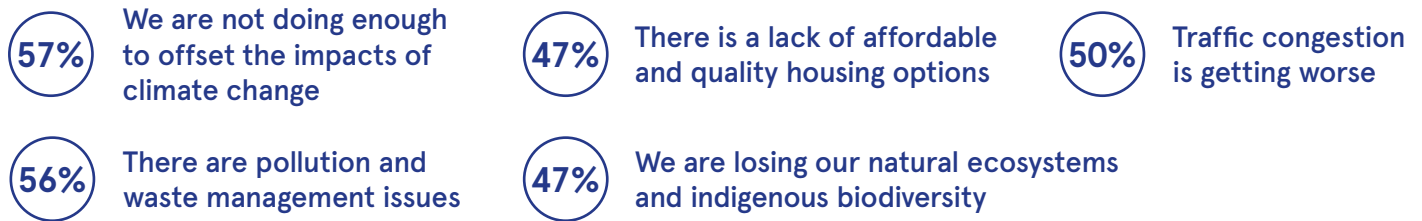

How people ranked each priority

- 1 Not doing enough to offset the impacts of climate change
- 2 Lack of affordable and quality housing options
- 3 Loss of our natural ecosystems and diversity
- 4 Traffic congestion getting worse
- 5 Pollution and waste management issues

Other priorities that ranked highly

- Urban areas spreading too far into rural areas
- A lack of economic activity and growth to support vibrancy
- Food and water shortages
- A lack of trust in democratic leadership and institutions

What unique things age groups said about Greater Christchurch in 2050

What people under 25 prioritise

- Carbon emissions (greenhouse gas) are minimised (rank 1)
- The economy is environmentally sustainable (rank 2)
- Native ecosystems are protected for improved biodiversity (rank 4)

What people 20–64 prioritise

- People feel safe (rank 1)

What people over 65 prioritise

- There is an affordable range of quality housing options (rank 1)
- Water and energy are used efficiently (rank 3)

What people over 65 are concerned about

- There is increased inequality (rank 4)

Through targeted conversations we know young people value natural places and spaces where people gather. They want to be more visible and have a stronger voice in a sub-region that is safe, clean, green, addresses issues of racism and embraces our Māoritanga.

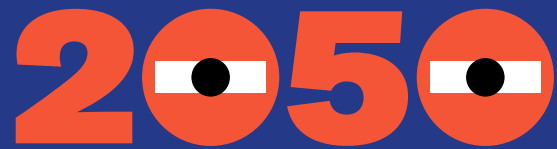

What SOME ethnicities are most concerned about for Greater Christchurch in 2050

-  Traffic congestion is getting worse
-  We are losing our natural ecosystems and indigenous biodiversity
-  There is increasing social isolation and loss of sense of community

What only ONE ethnicity is most concerned about for Greater Christchurch in 2050

-  There is a limited range and quality of job opportunities (Asian, rank 4)
-  There is not enough economic activity and growth to support vibrancy (Pacifika, rank 2)
-  We are losing local character, and cultural and historic heritage (Pacifika, rank 5)
